From your Pastor's Desk

A Joyful and Blessed Easter to All

Recently I was visiting a parishioner who was raised in the same neighborhood as my Grandma Trout and her sisters. He also worked with my Great-Grandfather for a short time when he was young. I love hearing the stories he shared about them, especially since I never met my Great-Grandmother, my Great Grandfather died when I was 5 years old and my Grandmother and her sisters are all gone. Hearing these stories connects me to my story because whether I knew them or not, they are part of my family and very much a part of who I am today.

Today we hear the story of Jesus' Resurrection. It isn't just an ancient story, it is our story. Our faith tells us that not only are we connected to this story of Resurrection but that we will also share in it in a very personal way as we will all be raised on the Last Day.

During Lent we have been journeying from the Ashes of Ash Wednesday to the Living Font of Baptism. This weekend at all the masses we are invited to renew our Baptismal promises and then we will be sprinkled with Holy Water. All this connects us to our Baptism and our story of dying with Christ in the Waters of Baptism to Rise with Him to new life. As we live our Baptism and recognize we have new life; as we live and practice this faith; it changes everything.

My Grandmother and her family are a good example of this. My Grandma practiced her faith and handed that faith on to her children. They in turn handed it on to the next generation. Not all of my aunts and uncles or cousins go to Church regularly but a number of them do. Yet, there is a closeness that my mom and her brothers and sisters have. They have always been there for each other and supported each other.

A few years before my great-uncle, my grandma's sister's husband, died; I had a conversation with him about faith. He and my Grandma's sister didn't practice any faith. Both were good people who loved their families. When talking to him he mentioned how he admired my Grandpa and Grandma and how close their children were. From the outside both families looked very similar. He said the one difference he could identify was the fact that my Grandparents were people of faith and that made the difference.

Faith does make that difference in our lives. Not just believing but also practicing this faith. Whether you are here every week or you are here just a couple times a year you are always welcome. But I put a challenge before you. It is the same challenge that St. Paul presents to us in the Second Reading, ***"Brothers and sisters: If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth."***

Keeping our eyes on what is above gives us hope. When we keep our eyes on what is above we are not as distracted by the things of this earth which are only able to give us happiness for a moment and then leave us wanting more. When we keep our eyes on what is above we are transformed and live with hope and joy.

On the Cover

Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!

Today's Readings: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Colossians 3:1-4; Sequence Victimae paschali laudes; John 20:1-9.

Coming to the tomb early in the morning, Mary Magdalene is expecting to spend time in the quiet in the darkness before dawn to mourn the death of Jesus. But she finds that the stone has been removed. Peter and other disciples come to the tomb, with their own expectations, and find only the burial cloths. Christ, the Paschal Victim, has been raised from the dead. Where is the stone?

Have you removed the stone that has been blocking your heart? Have the cloths that have covered your buried goodness been set aside? Resurrection is the joy of living fully in Christ. New life in Christ must be celebrated. It is all good news. Christ, who is our hope,

our Redeemer, and our life, is with us.

Easter is an opportunity to begin anew. The joy of the Resurrection should be unabashed joy, bold and unafraid. Christ has removed our burial cloths, and our renewal of baptismal promises reminds us that life in Christ is lived in the assembly of the faithful. The whole community shouts for joy: Alleluia! Find your newness of life and name it. Celebrate that new life with wholehearted singing and laughter. What has died within you has been changed into new life for the future. Throw open the windows, let in the light, and sing Alleluia! The Sequence today announces it firmly: Christ is risen from the dead, by this he has given us new life.

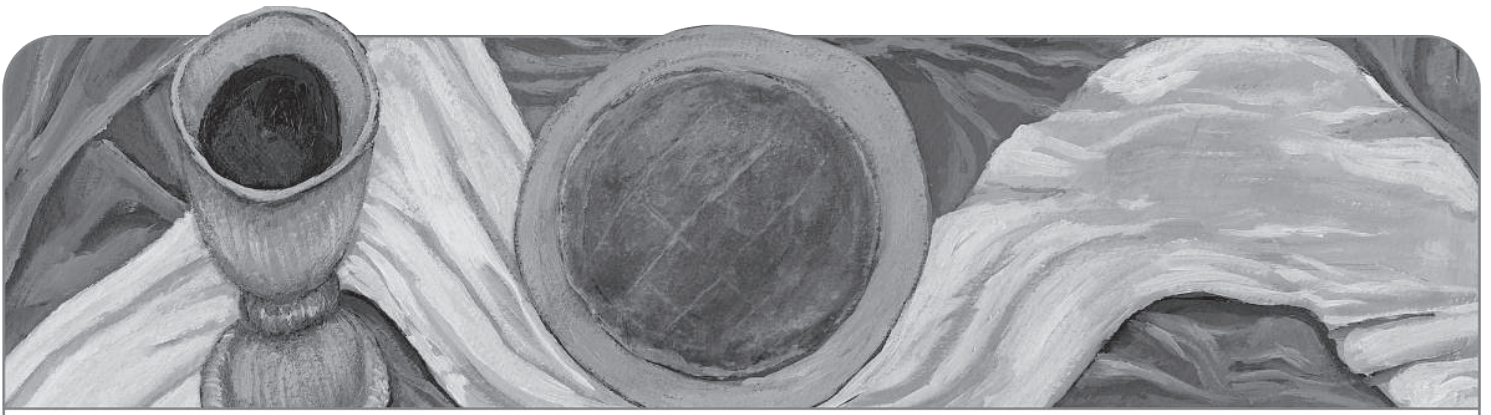
Seeking Truth Catholic Bible Study

When Jesus is walking with us, we can discern the true path. When Jesus is in our conversation, our hearts burn with the understanding that the Holy Spirit brings. When the bread that we break reveals God in our midst, we proclaim: Alleluia! During this Easter season, we may want to seek to open our hearts to the ways Christ is present to us. *Today's Readings: Acts 3:1–10; Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:13–35.*

Thursday, April 20

Faith in the Name of the Lord

Peter and John heal not by their own power but in the name of the Lord. That faith and that name are our inheritance. Repentance, healing, preaching to all nations—all are to be "in his name." Carry with you this day that joyful message: that it is God working through us that accomplishes our salvation. *Today's Readings: Acts 3:11–26; Psalm 8:2ab, 5, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:35–48.*

God of Surprises

In today's Gospel, we hear that Jesus provided an abundant number of fish for the disciples when they cast their net as he directed. As these disciples came ashore, he surprised them further with a breakfast that had been cooked over coals. How open are you to the surprises that God has prepared for you? *Today's Readings: Acts 4:1–12; Psalm 118:1–2, 4, 22–24, 25–27a; John 21:1–14.*

Saturday, April 22

Rejoice, Believe, and Proclaim

Have you found joy in your encounters this week? We carry our Easter joy especially throughout the Octave of Easter, finding daily opportunities to discover light, happiness, and good news in daily tasks, encounters, and experiences. It is not a time for hardness of heart, as Jesus reminds us in the Gospel today. Let your attitude spread the Good News of Christ, who has died and risen for us. Alleluia! *Today's Readings: Acts 4:13–21; Psalm 118:1, 14–15ab, 16–18, 19–21; Mark 16:9–15.*
