In addition, experiences of grief and loss have been all too common for so many families right here at home and throughout the world.

We long for the time, hopeful that it is coming soon, when we can fully come back together as a whole community, and together reignite the burning fire of God's grace in our parish community and beyond. As we contemplate this hope, we reflect on the following:
